Color Grading

Color grading can help create a mood, or provide coherence to an image. Different from color correction, which makes your images look like they appear in real life, color grading conveys a visual tone. There are multiple videos about how to color grade, but perhaps the simplest is that described by Blake Rudis using the Hue Saturation Lightness (HSL) sliders to adjust the properties of the color.

- 1- Make a new HSL Adjustment Layer
- 2- Change it to the Soft Light Blend mode
- 3- Press the Colorize button in the HSL properties
- 4- Use the Hue to select the color you want to add to your image
- 5- Use the Saturation slider to increase or decrease the intensity of the color grade
- 6- Use the Lightness to add contrast to the color.
- 7- Experiment with masks or Blend If

You can also play with the blend modes to see what you get and if you like it. Some of the effects can be striking.

And here's where I make a confession. I had no idea I was supposed to change the blend mode to Soft Light. Or, if I did, that memory disappeared. So, I've played with gradients and mapping could never could figure out why my photos looked so weird.

Playing isn't reserved for kids... adults with photo processing software can play, too. And sometimes, even watch a video or two and learn something.
